The Demonstration and Information session will help students to make an informed decision about which instrument they would like to learn and give Instrumental Teachers an opportunity to suggest instrument suitability. **\*\*Please note current DfE string students are not eligible to take up another instrument with a DfE instrumental teacher\*\***

**When:** Lessons begin in week 4 of term 1, 2023. Students attend lessons for half an hour each week, on Thursdays between 9.30 and 10.30am. Later in the year we will be forming the beginner band in preparation for performances for hub schools and families.

**Where:** At Brighton Secondary School. Transport is the responsibility of the parents.

**Cost:** Lessons are free, BUT

- Your school can hire an IMS Instrument at a cost is \$180pa, or you can source your own instrument
- The tutor book is ~\$30 and the admin fee is \$13 per semester.

**Parent role:** Discuss the idea of learning an instrument with your child. Include in the discussion these main points:

- A flexible attitude to instrument choice; to ensure a successful Hub Band Program it is vital that there is a balance of instruments, therefore numbers on each instrument will be capped and some students may be offered their 2<sup>nd</sup> or 3<sup>rd</sup> preference.
- The need to practice.
- Commitment for the whole year
- How much fun it will be!

Once your child has started it is expected that they will attend all lessons, continue for the whole year, and practice at home!
